he Washington "Red Coats" visited the South Shore League last week. Coach Kush Sidhu told his team that if they wanted to get better they should check out the competition here.

"I told them if they wanted their game to improve they should come to Boston and play some serious teams," Sidhu said. "It's a good guide for them to see what's out there." His team was badly beaten by Canton but had a victory over Framingham. "Canton's the toughest team we've played so far."

Because there are so few teams in the D.C. area the "Red Coats" typically travel for miles every weekend to play. Sidhu said they travel to Delaware, Newark and Philadelphia. But because of his own background he knew Boston would be a great test for them.

"I coached Northeastern for four years," he said. He worked with Canton

. He worked with Canton coach, Paula Dumart and helped with the National Teams in Michigan. He moved from Everett because of a job opportunity in D.C. The "Red Coats" are

glad to have Sidhu on their team. "He's not the first coach we've had but he's the best," the team's captain said. Ann Elizabeth Lovett-better known as A.E.-doesn't even mind the travel Sidhu suggests. "We've gone as far as Providence," the twenty-three-year-old said. The team ranges in age from 17-30.

"I've coached boys' prep-schools and studied coaching in education,"
Sidhu said. Though he could have easily moved into the more recognized boys' market, Sidhu wanted to coach women. "Girls deserve good coaching. They're willing to learn and they're motivated to play tough competition."
He said he doesn't even care if his players can't make games, as long as they show up for practice.

"Otherwise you just make the same mistakes again and again and you don't learn," he said. Sidhu envisions a stronger National Women's Team if coaches like himself work in different markets throughout the country to develop the talent that is out there.
